## A MESSAGE FROM THE COMMANDANT OF THE MARINE CORPS

Every unit experiences personnel turnover. Often, it seems that just about the time a Marine gets really good at his job, the Corps sees fit to move him or her on to the next assignment. General Terrence Dake, however, set a new standard: he was great from the very moment he became Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps.


