

They All Fell Out for the

hen the Marine Corps League sponsors a shindig, people come. They've been holding the Modern Day Marine Military Exposition annually at Marine Corps Air Facility, Quantico, Va., for eight years since moving out of Washington, D.C., in 1994 and are still drawing throngs of military men and women as well as contractors and just plain interested folks.

Annually, more than 200 exhibitors make up the high-tech bazaar—now in its 22nd year. The expo is located in 44,000 square feet spread through and between three large aircraft hangars, making it the largest display of weapons, equipment and supplies essential to amphibious and expeditionary operations in the world.

The highlight of the expo, hosted by the Capital Marine Detach-



ment, is the League's Enlisted Awards Parade and Presentation on the air facility tarmac. It is attended not only by the Corps' top brass—including the Commandant of the Marine Corps, General James L. Jones; Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps Alford L. McMichael; and officials of the Marine Corps League; National Commandant John P. Tuohy and Executive Director Brooks Corley—but also by captains of the industries and defense contractors represented at the expo as well as leaders and youngsters of the Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps programs.

Companies A and B from Marine Barracks, Washington, D.C., including the Silent Drill Platoon and the United States Marine Corps Drum and Bugle Corps, provided the snap and pomp of a professional military backdrop, as those who presented awards looked on from the reviewing stand.

Awards were presented to 10 individuals who contributed greatly to the combat readiness of their units and the Marine Corps in 2002. Winners in the various categories were as follows:

Staff Sergeant Patrick L. Keister, Counter Mechanized Platoon, 1st Battalion, Fifth Marine Regiment, Camp Pendleton, Calif., won the Sergeant Major Wilbur Bestwick Award, presented to a Marine in a ground combat element of the Marine operating forces.

Gunnery Sergeant Richard J. Watson, based at Marine Corps Air Station, Yuma, Ariz., earned the Sergeant Major Frederick B. Douglass Award for significant contributions and increased combat readiness in an aviation element of the Marine operating forces.

SSgt Michael B. Coffin, Company Embarkation, Maintenance, Supply Chief, Headquarters Plt, 1st Bulk Fuel Co, 7th Engineer Support Battalion, First Force Service Support Group, Camp Pendleton, received the Sergeant Harry D. Myers Award for a Marine serving in a combat service support element of Marine operating forces.




